Literacy - The Ticket to Success A report card on the 2011 Tutor Conference

Once again, the Portland Literacy Council's annual tutor conference combined inspirational and informative workshops, amazing student speakers, and good old-fashioned planning and hard work. The conference re-energizes and motivates tutors who are the backbone of local volunteer literacy efforts.

The Tutor Conference attendance numbers continue to grow each year, with 124 attendees this year. Fifteen presenters and 15 workshops provided content ranging from hands-on activities, culture exchange, and a documentary film about the challenges faced by undocumented youth.

Program Highlight - the Amazing Student Speakers Who Reach into Our Hearts

While conference attendees spend the morning and afternoon sessions learning, the luncheon program with its student speakers rivets the tutors' attentions to the realities adults face in leaving their countries and learning new languages.

Speakers' topics this year ranged from surviving a genocide, adjusting to cultural differences, and finding inspiration to improve English skills. The speakers, all from St. Anthony's Catholic Church program in Tigard, were Guadalupe Andres Sales Ordonez, Hongcuc (Cookie) Ritter, and Eliuth Ayala.

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Surviving Genocide

The first speaker, Mr. Ordonez, who was born in Mexico in 1985, recounted his family's experiences of the 1980s when there was much conflict in Central America. The family is Maya and had lived for generations in Guatemala until the conflict forced them to take refuge in the mountains where they sought shelter behind boulders and among tree roots. Fleeing from soldiers, they survived shootings, bombings, diseases and the weather. The family escaped to Mexico where they received support and asylum.

When he was 10 years old, Mr. Ordonez's father recounted to him the family's survival during that desperate time, yet instilled in him a love for their homeland of Guatemala. His family has scattered to Mexico, Guatemala, the United States and Spain, yet Mr. Ordonez continues to look forward to the day he might return and live in Guatemala. In addition to learning English, he is learning all phases of construction so that when he returns he can use this knowledge to help his family.

Mr. Ordonez chose the genocide for his speech topic because he believes few Americans know of these events. He reminded us that many immigrants carry important stories about the world that they can share with us once they learn our language.

English Success

Hongcuc (Cookie) Ritter has been taking English classes at St. Anthony's in Tigard since 2006. Her command of English includes humor, and she shared with us her American husband's assertion that she is from the moon rather than Vietnam.

Ms. Ritter's speech focused on cultural differences between Vietnam and the US. She misses being able to walk down the street from 6 a.m. to midnight, listening to music and seeing the many restaurants where tasty food is served day and night. She noted, in contrast, that our restaurants close early and that we have to drive to get our food.

Another contrast is the weather. Ms. Ritter finds Portland cold in winter and hot in summer. In Vietnam, thunderstorms shook school buildings and lightning was a noisy reminder of the weather.

While she used to carry a dictionary wherever she went, Ms. Ritter is now enrolled in spring term ESL Level 5 classes at PCC. Her goal is to help other Vietnamese people who don't speak English.

Music Makes the World Go Round

Eliuth Ayala has been living in the US for ten years. He has used grocery store produce, music, television, and St. Anthony's English classes to learn the language. His favorite groups include U2 and Guns N' Roses; he has a special affinity for Ryan Adams.

Mr. Ayala related how he would hear the Ryan Adams' song "Everything I Do I Do for You," and although he didn't understand the lyrics he just knew that was how he felt about his wife. As a present one year, he gave her a recording of the song. When he finally understood the words, they confirmed his intuition about his emotions.

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Tutor Support Makes a Difference

The three speakers are from the Advanced Class at the ESOL program sponsored by St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Tigard. Carolyn Talarr, a tutor at the St. Anthony's program, worked many hours with the students, helping them polish their speeches and presentations. Ms. Talarr's background includes working in community-based organizations in New York City for several years.

Pronunciation Techniques for ESL

ORTESOL (Oregon Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages) is presenting a one-day workshop led by Susan Ginley, a speech language pathologist from PSU, Ms. Ginley will share speech-pathologist techniques to target specific pronunciation issues such as consonants, vowels, and prosody. Attendees will learn about evaluation protocols and processes to assess the pronunciation of English-language learners, how to develop a plan to target specific pronunciation issues, and techniques appropriate to specific situations.
