## The Good Works of Lisa Regimbal

Lisa Regimbal will have a lasting impact on literacy services in the Portland metro area. During her tenure as Adult Literacy Services Coordinator at Multnomah County Library, Lisa won a service award, set up volunteer literacy tutor programs, coordinated online learning, and worked collaboratively with literacy programs in the metro area.

The Superior Public Service to External Customers award honored Lisa's work as the Library's Adult Literacy Services Coordinator, a position she held from 2014 until her retirement in late 2023. She's quick to mention she worked with a wonderful team, that more than 80 volunteers help carry out the work of Adult Literacy Services, and that she values working with a diverse group of tutors from varying backgrounds and skill sets. Lisa implemented Drop In Tutoring at Multnomah County Library. During 2-hour time slots at various Library branches volunteer tutors offer literacy assistance to adult learners. Requests include improving English skills for non-native speakers, providing basic literacy tutoring (reading, writing, spelling) for native English speakers, helping job seekers prep for licensing exams, writing a business letter, studying for the GED® in English or Spanish, etc.

Drop In Tutoring is now offered at five library branches. To provide continuity during the time of COVID, Lisa's Adult Literacy Services group worked with library tutors for online delivery of Talk Time (English conversation) sessions, and 1:1 tutoring for GED and English learners. The library also used this online learning model to provide a wider array of services during the recent construction closures at several branches.

Adult Literacy Services is also known for collaborations with other literacy programs in the metro area. Portland Literacy Council has partnered with the Library's GED efforts and recruiting volunteer tutors, as well as providing tutor training programs and an annual volunteer tutor conference. The library is able to offer structured classes including citizenship classes taught by SOAR volunteers, English classes taught by Goodwill Industries, and the nonprofit TORUS Transforms offers English classes for independent learners.

Lisa served in many capacities during her tenure at the library, beginning in 1995 as an on-call sub. Subsequent positions included reference librarian in periodicals (1998), bi-lingual librarian (2000-13), and Adult Literacy Coordinator (2014-2023). She would like readers to know that the Adult Literacy program is in the good hands of Lilia Monje, its new coordinator of Adult Literacy Services and her staff.

Getting used to being retired, gardening, and travel are on Lisa's retirement to-do list. Thank you, Lisa, for your meaningful partnership with PLC over the years. We wish you well and will miss you dearly.


## Remembering Penny Russman

Penny passed peacefully at home on December 28, 2023.




# Equity Through Literacy Returns Saturday May 11, 2024
