Foundational Literacy Skills for Native English Speakers

Unlike many of our learners' first languages, English has a relatively low correlation between sounds and the letters that are used to spell those sounds. In this session we'll explore and practice ways to introduce and practice the 16 vowel sounds, a few consonants and digraphs that have multiple sounds, and the most common spelling patterns for syllables with long- and short-vowel sounds, to help learners decode the puzzle of English spelling. Practice activities for in-person and on-line learning will be demonstrated, with links to free resources.
